August's Book Club/Library will be held at Chez Sangster at St Jean de Sauves.

**Walk**                      **Sat 8<sup>th</sup> August**                      **10.00 am**                      **Thorigné**

This walk will start in the village of Thorigné and is about 7.6 km long with a 5km alternative, which also has cut-offs to reduce it to about 3.5km. It is nearly all on grassy and stony tracks, and passes through a variety of countryside, about half of which is well shaded. The long walk goes down into the Lambon valley, and what goes down also comes up, with a 150 metre climb at 7% (that's quite steep), but there are no other significant hills. There is a stretch of path in the valley that could be muddy if there has been a lot of rain - hopefully not in August. As always, sturdy footwear is recommended. There are toilets at the start.

Thorigné is about 5km NW of Celles sur Belle. From Celles take the D948 towards Niort and after about 2km turn right onto the D304. At the roundabout in the centre of the village turn left and immediately right into the car park by the football pitch.

GPS ref N46°17.53', W0°15.11'

Lunch will be available at Le 4 Saisons in Celles sur Belle. This is situated in the middle of the village at 6 rue Ancienne Mairie, and there is a car park close behind at N46°15.70', W0°12.70'. For three courses, wine and coffee the cost will be 16€.

On the subject of: ***Songs, Scribes, and Society in 15th Century France: the History and Reception of the Loire Valley Chansonniers.*** This month we have a Guest speaker: Jane Alden, Professor and Chair of Music at Trinity College, Dublin.

Jane will talk about the assumption of aristocratic provenance for chansonniers, such as those produced in the Loire Valley during the 15th Century, which has only recently been overturned. Discoveries by David Fallows and others have shown that the earliest owners of deluxe chansonniers were from the upper middle classes and lower nobility, not traditional aristocrats. In particular, notaries and secretaries were active patrons of paintings, tapestries, sculpture, metalwork, jewellery, manuscripts and printed books, and music. Chansonniers would have had a particular appeal to these individuals, who are known also to have collected and written poetry. Approaching chansonniers as mixed media representations allows us to explore these objects in ways that better relate to their original milieu. The cost is **€5.00 per head**, to cover refreshments, hire of the room & heating (if needed).

**Directions** to Auberge des Voyageurs in Menigoute.

**From North** (Parthenay), exit towards Pompaire then via Vausseroux and La Pagerie, on mainly D176 and D21.      **From South** (Lezay), via D45 and D5 through Chey, La Mothe Saint Heray and Saint Germier.

**From West** (Champdeniers), via Saint Georges de Noisne, Chantecorps and La Pagerie, mainly D329.

**From East** (Poitiers), via La Torchaise and Sanxay, mainly D3. The restaurant itself is in the centre of the Bourg, opposite the small chapel.

**N.B. We have to confirm numbers to the Auberge one week before the meeting. As a result we will be charged for any people who DO NOT TURN up on the day.**

**So, we will have to charge individuals for "No Shows" on the day, sorry about this, but we have no choice!**

**Walk****Fri 25<sup>th</sup> Sept**      **10.00 am****Moulin des  
Prés, Azay  
sur Thouet**

The walk starts from the picnic area at the Moulin des Prés, between Secondigny and Azay-sur-Thouet. Its 8kms. along drovers' lanes, woodland paths and 'petits chemins'. Mainly gently undulating and varied countryside route with some excellent long distance views. There is a 15 minute upward slope (on tarmaced lane) 40 minutes into the walk, and a stretch on the 'home straight' can be rather muddy. So please come well-shod. Unfortunately there are no toilets near the start point, and there is no shorter version of the walk. However, it's only a few kilometres from Secondigny with its cafés, shops, and toilets, for any non-walkers. Lunch will be at the Hotel L'Ecu in Secondigny at a cost of €14.50.

Hotel L'Ecu is next to the traffic lights in Secondigny. Coming from Moulin des Prés, turn right at these lights and then left, into the large SuperU car park.

**Directions to Moulin des Prés:**

**From Parthenay**, take the D949b, (direction Secondigny) passing through Le Tallud and Azay sur Thouet; continue towards Secondigny, passing the Notre-Dame church (on your left, about 1km. from Azay) and turning left after another 1km. on to lane marked 'Moulin des Prés'. The Moulin is 1km from the D949b. There is car parking space but it is limited, so please park carefully.

**From Secondigny**, at traffic lights, take the D949b (direction Parthenay), passing the Maison de Pays de la Pomme (2kms) on the right before turning right, after another 1km, on to lane marked 'Moulin des Prés'.

### **BARN SALE**

The barn sale held at Sue and Gus Gurr's for the Gurkha Welfare Trust Nepal Earthquake Appeal raised the magnificent sum of €433.11. We'd like to thank the members of GT who attended for their generosity and support.

Sue & Gus have received a letter from The Gurkha Welfare Trust for this donation which says the following:

'Thanks to your support we are able to continue supporting Gurkha veterans, widows and their communities in areas affected by the recent earthquakes. Now the monsoon has arrived, it is vital we provide temporary shelter for those made homeless. In the longer term, we will continue to rebuild homes and villages, repairing damaged water projects and school buildings.

Since the earthquake we have already distributed over £32,797 in Hardship Grants, £270,388 on materials for shelter, £89,923 on Emergency Relief Packs, £13,918 on equipment such as torches, solar lights, and phone cards, £1,094 on medicine, and £13,350 on school facilities.
