We will meet at the car park opposite the cafes in the centre of the village of Vouvant. Toilets available.

A walk of approx 7kms. Shorter option available. Walk consists of country tracks, riverside walk and village ramparts. Tracks may be muddy appropriate footwear needed. Limited shade so sun hats and suncream required if hot and sunny. Lunch at Hotel Restaurant Le Lac, Fourchard nr Borneau.

Directions to walk start: From Niort take D148 to Fontenay le Comte then take the D938T to La Chataigneraie. After approx 12kms on this road turn right on D30 to Vouvant.

From Parthenay take D949B via Secondigny to La Chataigneraie. Then take the D938T to Fontenay le Comte. After approx 8 kms on this road turn left on D30 to Vouvant.

Directions to Restaurant: Turn left on leaving Vouvant car park. Continue to the La Chataigneraie / Fontenay le Comte main road then turn left towards Fontenay le Comte. After approx 6kms on this road the Le Lac Restaurant is situated on the right just off the Mervent roundabout. Ample parking.

Lunch includes starter, main course, dessert, wine + coffee for €13.

This walk will start in the village of Thorigné and is about 7.6 km long with a 5km alternative, which also has cut-offs to reduce it to about 3.5km. It is nearly all on grassy and stony tracks, and passes through a variety of countryside, about half of which is well shaded. The long walk goes down into the Lambon valley, and what goes down also comes up, with a 150 metre climb at 7% (that's quite steep), but there are no other significant hills. There is a stretch of path in the valley that could be muddy if there has been a lot of rain - hopefully not in August. As always, sturdy footwear is recommended.

Thorigné is about 5km NW of Celles sur Belle. From Celles take the D948 towards Niort and after about 2km turn right onto the D304. At the roundabout in the centre of the village turn left and immediately right into the car park by the football pitch. Lunch will be available at Le 4 Saisons in Celles sur Belle. This is situated in the middle of the village at 6 rue Ancienne Mairie, and there is a car park close behind. For three courses, wine and coffee the cost will be €16.

<u>History Group Day</u> <u>Wed 17th June</u> <u>Saintes</u> <u>Out</u>

The day began with our arrival at the *Abbaye aux Dames de Saintes*, where, the tourist brochure assures us, 'the ladies were abbesses, minted money, and carried the staff'. So, I mused as I got out of the car, getting reliable workers was a problem even all those years ago. But, for those of us who had not taken advantage of the motorway services, our attention turned first to the free car park's solitary toilet, which provided the day's initial talking point. A great deal of hilarity ensued when the loo's habit of disappearing into the wall at the critical moment was discovered, bringing a whole new meaning to the phrase being caught with one's pants down! Meanwhile (and by way of pointing out that the site does have other well-maintained and clean facilities), the more intrepid explorers amongst the group had found a water closet in the tourist office which did not run off at the first sign of human presence. Still, I can't help feeling that there was a certain primeval satisfaction to be gained from having to catch your loo before you could use it...

Anyway, enough of the toilet humour and on to the main event. On such a glorious morning, one could not fail to be impressed by the collection of buildings which comprise the Abbaye aux Dames. The Abbey was founded in the 12th century, and the church and its associated convent housed Benedictine nuns until their violent expulsion during the French Revolution, at which time the site became a prison and military barracks. The facade of the church and bell tower has been described rightly as 'a jewel of Saintonge Romanesque architecture', adorned with a multitude of magnificent stone carvings depicting biblical scenes. The interior of the church represented little more than a blank shell, however, leaving a feeling of disappointment that even the permanent exhibition of modern Jean-François Favre tapestries could not dispel; which perhaps explains why our extremely knowledgeable English speaking guide seemed reluctant to interrupt her discourse on the meaning of life in medieval France and take us inside. Indeed, the same might be said of the interior of the attached convent, where the pristine restoration gave an overwhelming impression of space and light, which seemed strangely at odds with the Abbey's history, either as a place of silent and solitary meditation, or as a dark and brooding prison for the enemies of the Revolution.

It is said that all ancient buildings have a voice, but that of the *Abbaye aux Dames* appeared stifled by the unsympathetic nature of the restoration: and, as a result, I could hear neither the murmur of nuns at prayer, nor the tortured cries of those unfortunate souls awaiting the pleasure of Madame Guillotine in later times. In short, the exterior of the Abbey speaks volumes; but the interior, sadly, has little to say.



The contrast between the highly decorated façade of the Abbey, and the almost sanitised emptiness of the interior rooms provided much food for thought and Page 7 of 9 http://www.getogether-france.org

discussion at lunch, which – judging by the additional merriment involved – was greatly enjoyed by all. After lunch, we took a stroll along the main thoroughfare, impressively lined by shops, restaurants and cafés, to the riverside. There, in the shadow of Saintes' *Arc de Germanicus* of 18-19 AD, the group boarded the *Ville de Saintes*, to enjoy – in the words of the brochure – a trip on a 'traditional wooden boat and discover the wildlife of the River Charente, along with its history and that of its sailors'. I'm sure few of us would disagree with that sentiment. All in all, our day in the enchanting town of Saintes was a great success, and a tribute to David and Rebecca, and Jeremy and Jackie, who put so much effort into organising the event.

The tranquil atmosphere is sustained by the use of couplets which provide casual layers between a series of dreamy observations. But there is something elusive in the poem, a shadowy element introduced by the dead dog and echoed in the tomb of the final stanza.

The use of the senses enhances the reader's absorption of the setting and the time of day, with their gentle blending of stillness and movement. The bell's tolling brings an unexpected recollection, altering time and location, leaving us hovering between worlds. Moreover, the tenderness between the couple is conveyed without a trace of sentimentality.

Like many a good poem, we are told enough to invite our questions.'
