# Walk Sat 7<sup>th</sup> Nov 10:30 am Montjean, Charente

#### Please note the date for this walk.

The walk starts in the village of Montjean in the northern Charente, a few kilometres south of Sauzé Vaussais on the D54. Ample parking can be found adjacent to the tennis court and the Salle de Fêtes, where there are toilets.

The walk will consist of open country and wooded areas along quiet country roads and lanes. As ever, given the time of year, suitable footwear should be worn.

The main walk will be about 8 km in length, with a shorter option. There will be some small hills, but nothing strenuous.

Lunch will be taken at Relais de la Peruse in Montjean and will consist of 4 courses (buffet, main, cheese & dessert), wine and coffee included for 13€.

There will be a plat de jour and an option for non meat eaters.

## History Group Thurs 19<sup>th</sup> 3.00 pm Menigoute Nov

France and the Great War: (2) Lions and Donkeys Presented by Vaughan Wells In the inaugural lecture of this series, we discussed one of the major controversies that continues to surround the origins of the Great War: simply put, could France have avoided war?

In August 1914, thousands of Frenchmen (whether rightly or wrongly) responded to that question with a resounding 'no!', and set off for the frontiers determined to defend their nation against the threat posed by German militarism. But the war they had been promised was not the war they got.

By November it was apparent that the 'battle of the borders' had been lost, as the war of movement atrophied suddenly into the stalemate of the Western Front.

Trench warfare cost the lives of 953 French soldiers per day in 1915 (the highest total for any single year of the war), and their horrified comrades blamed incompetent generals whose battles were, or seemed to be, futile and bloody failures. Thus emerged the 'lions led by donkeys' thesis, which - although the cause of heated debate amongst students of the Great War from a British perspective - has seldom been applied with the French case in mind. Today's discussion attempts to redress that imbalance.

The cost is €5.00 per head, to cover refreshments, hire of the room & heating (if needed).

**Directions** to Auberge des Voyageurs in Menigoute.

**From North** (Parthenay), exit towards Pompaire then via Vausseroux and La Pagerie, on mainly D176 and D21. **From South** (Lezay), via D45 and D5 through Chey, La Mothe Saint Heray and Saint Germier.

**From West** (Champdeniers), via Saint Georges de Noisne, Chantecorps and La Pagerie, mainly D329.

From East (Poitiers), via La Torchaise and Sanxay, mainly D3.

The restaurant itself is in the centre of the Bourg, opposite the small chapel.

N.B. We have to confirm numbers to the Auberge one week before the meeting. As a result we will be charged for any people who DO NOT TURN up on the day.

So, we will have to charge individuals for "No Shows" on the day, sorry about this, but we have no choice!

It will consist of an aperitif, Kir Royale or fruity mulled wine, a choice of starter, main course and dessert, coffee and 1/2 litre of wine each at cost of 20 Euros.
