Walk Sat 16th Jan <u>10.30 am</u> Lezay

Please note the revised date for this walk (restaurant availability).

There will be a walk of approximately 8Km, with a shorter option of 4 to 5Km. The walk will be on the flat and will comprise by-roads and well made tracks. Never-the-less, suitable footwear should be worn given the season.

The starting point will be the extremely wide junction of the D14 Lezay to Couhé road and the D17, which goes to St Sauvant. Grid Ref: 46^o 16' 34" N, 0^o 0' 24" E. There are no toilets at the start.

Lunch will be taken at the Market Restaurant in Lezay, and will consist of starter, main, cheese & dessert including a ¼ litre of wine and coffee. The cost will be 16€50 and a choice of chicken or fish.

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The walk will start from the car park in the centre of La Chapelle Thireuil, where public toilets are available.

The main walk is 8km which will be mostly on tracks which could be muddy, so please bring appropriate footwear. A shorter walk of 4km is also available, but please note that due to the nature of the Gâtine countryside, BOTH WALKS ARE QUITE HILLY.

Lunch will be taken at L'Edelweiss Restaurant in Coulonges-sur-L'Autize (5 rue de la Gare) and the cost for a 3 course lunch with wine and coffee is €14.00 per person. Any non-walkers are most welcome to come along and enjoy the lunch. History Group Thurs 18th 3.00 pm Menigoute Feb

This month we have another Guest speaker: Nick Wells, Senior Archaeologist at Foundations Archaeology. Nick has previously undertaken analysis of a coin hoard in

2010. He has over 20 years experience in all aspects of archaeology. He has also run several projects from Cornwall to Perth. His Topic Today is:

From Gallia to Francia; The transformation of Aquitania Secunda from the 4th to the 6th centuries.

Aquitania Secunda in the 4th century was a relatively peaceful province far enough away from the Rhine frontier to be untroubled by constant border wars. Various civil wars, often fomented by rebellious military leaders in the provinces of Britain, passed the region by heading to the centre of imperial government via Arles and onwards to Rome. The province's capital, Bordeaux, and the main military post, Poitiers, were thus unscathed and the picture painted by our aristocratic sources of the region is one of tranquillity and wealth. Yet this idyllic world would come tumbling to the ground in the first two decades of the 5th century. First by the migration of a loose confederation of Germanic tribes who crossed the frozen Rhine in the winter of 406 and pushed southwards to Spain, and then in 418 by the settlement of the Visigoths in Aquitania fresh after their sacking of Rome.

Over the next hundred years the region became the centre of power politics between Imperial Rome and the dominant Visigoths – until the battle of Vouillé near Poitiers in 507 when the Visigothic king, Alaric II, was defeated by Clovis I, king of the Franks. This talk will explore the nature of late Roman society in Aquitania Secunda, the effect of the Germanic incursions into the area and examine the transition from a Visigothic kingdom to the precursor of what was to become France.

The cost is **€5.00 per head**, to cover refreshments, hire of the room & heating (if needed).

Directions to Auberge des Voyageurs in Menigoute.

From North (Parthenay), exit towards Pompaire then via Vausseroux and La Pagerie, on mainly D176 and D21. **From South** (Lezay), via D45 and D5 through Chey, La Mothe Saint Heray and Saint Germier.

From West (Champdeniers), via Saint Georges de Noisne, Chantecorps and La Pagerie, mainly D329.

From East (Poitiers), via La Torchaise and Sanxay, mainly D3. The restaurant itself is in the centre of the Bourg, opposite the small chapel.

N.B. We have to confirm numbers to the Auberge one week before the meeting. As a result we will be charged for any people who DO NOT TURN up on the day. So, we will have to charge individuals for "No Shows" on the day, sorry about this, but we have no choice!
