# Walk Sat 13<sup>th</sup> Feb 10.30 am Pamproux

This walk will take place in and around the village of Pamproux, which is situated to the NE of La Mothe St Heray. We did it about five years ago, this time we'll do it backwards - not actually walking backwards, just in the opposite direction. It is about 8km on quiet roads and tracks, with optional cut offs at 4km and 6 km and no, it's not flat. There are some short, sharp slopes, but not very steep or very long. The going is generally very good, but there is a short stretch that could be muddy after a lot of rain, and strong footwear is recommended as usual.

The start will be from the car park in the centre of the village, opposite the Mairie and the Auberge du Trefle à Quatre Feuilles, where we will partake of lunch for 14€, including coffee. GPS ref N46°23.71', W 0°03.325'

#### <u>History Group</u> <u>Thurs 18th</u> <u>3.00 pm</u> <u>Menigoute</u> <u>Feb</u>

This month we have another guest speaker: Nick Wells, Senior Archaeologist at Foundations Archaeology. Nick has previously undertaken analysis of a coin hoard in 2010. He has over 20 years experience in all aspects of archaeology. He has also run several projects from Cornwall to Perth. The topic is:

# From Gallia to Francia:

The transformation of Aquitania Secunda from the 4<sup>th</sup> to the 6<sup>th</sup> centuries.

Aquitania Secunda in the 4<sup>th</sup> century was a relatively peaceful province far enough away from the Rhine frontier to be untroubled by constant border wars. Various civil wars, often fomented by rebellious military leaders in the provinces of Britain, passed the region by heading to the centre of imperial government via Arles and onwards to Rome.

The province's capital, Bordeaux, and the main military post, Poitiers, were thus unscathed and the picture painted by our aristocratic sources of the region is one of tranquillity and wealth. Yet this idyllic world would come tumbling to the ground in the first two decades of the 5<sup>th</sup> century. First by the migration of a loose confederation of Germanic tribes who crossed the frozen Rhine in the winter of 406 and pushed southwards to Spain, and then in 418 by the settlement of the Visigoths in Aquitania fresh after their sacking of Rome.

Over the next hundred years the region became the centre of power politics between Imperial Rome and the dominant Visigoths – until the battle of Vouillé near Poitiers in 507 when the Visigothic king, Alaric II, was defeated by Clovis I, king of the Franks. This talk will explore the nature of late Roman society in Aquitania Secunda, the effect of the Germanic incursions into the area and examine the transition from a Visigothic kingdom to the precursor of what was to become France.

The walk will start in the centre of St Vincent la Chatre which can be found on D105 from Lezay or the D305 from Melle. We will meet in the car park at St Vincent in front of the church and by the side of La Poste.

After the excesses of Christmas dining, it was a delight to gather in La Grimaudière for the final GT Walk of the year. 15 eager souls, and one representative (Yorkie, Bess) of the GT canine section, set off in unseasonally fine weather on the 'figure of 8' Report by John Matthews



route cunningly devised by Kate and Grant, to enable anyone with walking difficulties to take a shorter route, if necessary- though no-one took up the opportunity! Starting with the obligatory group photo (to ensure the same number of members return as set out-and to identify anyone going missing en route?) we admired the lavoir near the car park before passing on, via a small lake, to the church then on to the renovated flour mill, in the hamlet of Surin.. Here we learned that the 17th Century water wheel had been restored to its former glory and that now, on a number of days in the year, the mill was again producing flour. A further lavoir was admired as were many large logis and maisons de maitres hinting at the former economic importance of the area. During the walk we marvelled at the impressive source of the River Dive (from which the walk 'Le Sentier Divin' takes its name), and the intricate network of streams leading off it, along with the well-kept small bridges enabling walkers to cross them. The water was so clear that wild 'mache' grows in it, while the mild weather meant we were able (at the end of December!) to spot some kingcups growing along one of the banks. For lunch, there were 18 of us who (having pulled the crackers provided by Kate) were able to enjoy the excellent meal (both content & value for money) served by the cheerful staff of Le Bacchus in Martaizé. Our grateful thanks to Kate & Grant for organising yet another fascinating walk and arranging such an enjoyable lunch. A fitting end to GT's 2015 walking programme, and our appetites have been whetted for this next year's programme.

First Aid Course Mon 25<sup>th</sup> Jan

Parthenay 1 -

<u>Report by John</u> <u>Buckley</u>

Nine GT members arrived at the Centre de Secours in Parthenay on a lovely sunny morning at the ridiculously early hour of 9am. For some of us, this had involved a start at 7.30am – unheard of in recent years!

We were made very welcome initially by John Hoyland, a retired British fireman who works as a volunteer for the Sapeur-Pompiers mainly in Parthenay. Following a very welcome coffee we met the Station commander, who spoke excellent English and Nicholas, a professional member of the team, who spoke only limited English and was bravely presenting his first course to a group of English people, which he did with great good humour.

The Department of Deux Sèvres is very keen to increase the numbers of people trained in basic life saving and resuscitation techniques because of problems of response times in the remoter parts of the Department. Following successful completion of the course, attendees become certified "first aiders" at the most basic level and will be included on the lists of such people maintained by the Prefecture. We were taught the basic techniques of assessing situations, reducing hazards, determining what action to take in terms of severity of injury/illness. Following on from this, we then learnt how to deal with choking events, situations where the casualty is not breathing including CPR and the use of defibrillators. We had plenty of opportunity to practise our newly learned skills on each other and their collection of dummies.



After lunch we had the rare privilege of being shown the Control Room



followed by the Garages and the vehicles including their newest appliance with it's' state of the art equipment. The course was mainly delivered in very clear French (as is the law!), with aided and abetted by John Hoyland in English when clarification was necessary.

By 5pm, we were all exhausted and practically brain dead but a lot wiser! All in all, a very worthwhile day and I would highly recommend it to anyone should the opportunity arise again. Thanks are due to the Sapeur-Pompiers and John Hoyland in Parthenay and Roger Amsden for organising our participation.
