This month our presenter is Gaynor Mickelborough speaking on

The Search for Marianne.

3.00 pm

The search for Marianne began with the advent of the *First Republic* in 1792.

The new Republic sought a new and distinct symbol to represent its aims and philosophies, and sought a figurehead that would

unite a divided nation behind the ideals of *liberté, égalité, fratenité* rather than the absolutist dictat of the *Ancien Régime*. In order to achieve this end, Marianne has had to be essentially all things to all men, and (to quote the French government's official website) had to appear 'at times fiery and warlike', whilst at the same time displaying the 'pacific and nurturing' republican breast. An obviously impossible task for a man, but no less difficult for a woman in a man's world: unless, of course, one accepts that Marianne's obvious and well-endowed femininity was (and still is?) nothing other than a male construct – a product of the search by innumerable French revolutionaries, presidents and politicians for the perfect allegorical image in an imperfect social and political milieu. Consequently, Marianne has been born and reborn in various guises during the course of five republics and two world wars – a topic that provides us with an illuminating study in itself. But perhaps the more pertinent question is – have they found her yet or is it a question of 'dreaming on'?

We will meet at the picnic area of the Plan d'eau du Soleil Levant. The walk is around the top part of the reservoir approx 8 kms. Hopefully the sun will shine but it is a must to wear footwear with a good grip and it could be muddy in places.

It's generally flat with lovely views of the lake, it makes for an interesting walk. Toilets are available at the start.

Please note that there are two picnic areas, the one on the Clave side is brand new, it's not this one, travel across the bridge (towards St George de Noise) and it's the first turning on the right, you will see the toilet block and picnic/ parking area.

Directions:- If coming from St Maixent L'Ecole take the D938 (direction Parthenay), as you enter Les Grand Ajoncs take the first turning on the left S.P Clave, follow this road and signs for Clave, as you enter the village, turn left onto the D329, cross over the bridge and first right to parking. If you are coming from the D748, initially follow signs to St George de Noise, then Clave. Take the left turning 100 m BEFORE the bridge.

We will be going to L'Auberge des Voyageurs, 2 Place de la Mairie, Menigoute for lunch.

History Group Thurs 18th Feb Menigoute

We welcomed Archaeologist Nick Wells to the History Group meeting in February as our Guest Speaker, his topic *From Gallia to Francia*.

During Nick's very interesting and entertaining talk we learnt much about the ambitions and aims of the Roman Empire in Gaul during the 4th to the 6th centuries, much of which seemed strangely familiar to us in the 21st century.

Military conquest and changes in the conduct of military warfare and

weaponry, political ambition, mass movement of peoples, religious controversy, financial manipulation, massive infrastructure projects were all part of this Roman World view. In what we probably regard now as 'our' Province, then named Aquitania Secunda, the capital was Bordeaux in the south, which had a strong military garrison as did Poitiers in the north, but generally the area was wealthy and peaceful as 'we' were off the important beaten track to Imperial Rome, that is until the Visigoths turned up, and the rest as they say is history!

We hope that it will be possible for Nick Wells to come back again soon with his infectious enthusiasm and tell us a great deal more about this subject, Visigoths and all.

She asked whether it was true that the clause had an upper financial limit?

I now think she was probably referring to Inheritance Tax between spouses when the house, on the first death, was transferred to the surviving spouse's name. Several years ago there was an inheritance tax free limit of F500,000 (€76,000) between married couples. However, Inheritance tax between spouses (and PACS'd couples) was abolished in 2007 so, the value passes to the survivor without any tax liability.

Mouilleron des Pareds

Hallelujah – after days of English-like weather, Friday 26 February dawned bright and beautiful. This no doubt contributed to the healthy turnout of 19 walkers and accompanying dogs for a walk along the colline des moulins (ridge of windmills) near Mouilleron-en-Pareds, the picturesque town just inside the border of Vendee. Yours truly kept the party waiting as a result of my mad Brittany spaniel going AWOL from home and, then, being stuck behind a learner truck driver for almost the entire journey to Mouilleron. Duly assembled and accounted for by walk organiser Barbara Whitehouse, we set off through the narrow streets of Mouilleron.

For such a small country town, it punches way above it's weight in terms of history. It's the birth place of George Clemenceau, head of the French government during World War I and who signed the <u>Treaty of Versailles</u> with <u>Lloyd George</u>, Vittorio Emanuele Orlando and Woodrow Wilson. The house where he was born was bought by the state in 2006 and converted into a museum.

The more recent local hero is the fine gentleman by the name <u>Marshal Jean de Lattre</u> <u>de Tassigny</u>, who led the French First Army during the liberation of France with the allied forces in 1945. There's a grand memorial to the marshal along the footpath from town to the colline de moulins.

Winding our way out of town, we passed a fine example of a 18C century fountain with an adjoining 'lavoir'. It's worth noting that to do the walk up to the windmills, you don't have to start from town: there's a car park at the beginning of the walk with a large viewing platform overlooking the countryside for kilometres.

The star attraction of the walk is the refurbished windmills dating back to the 15C. These were strategically located at the top of a granite to catch the prevailing wind and were used in the production of flour. More than 13 of the windmills were destroyed in the Revolution. Much later, under the ownership of the marshal, some of the windmills were rebuilt on the original site. Some of them have been only partly renovated and one has been converted into a chapel. The history of the mills and the local area is well documented along the trail by way of ceramic plaques mounted on rocks. If you happen to be passing at night, the illuminated mills make for a very impressive sight. The combination of the good weather, abundant local history and an interesting orientation table, meant that the group was soon spread out investigating the various points of interest. Before long, it was time to head back to town for a meal at the

Clemenceau restaurant. A smaller group eager to make the most of the winter sunshine continued to the endpoint of circuit – a statue of Mary and Child strategically located on a granite outcrop with stunning views. The return leg was boggy in places but the extra

effort was worth it and nobody seemed to mind us being late for the starters! The Clemenceau restaurant is owned by a young British couple – he was in the Signals in the Army. The food is freshly-cooked and unpretentious and represents good value for money. The owners are really making an effort by holding curry evenings, quiz nights and visits from the fish and chips van. For eating out, there are other possibilities, including a traditional French restaurant called La Table du Centre near the church square.



All-in-all, Mouilleron offers excellent walking with great views and an interesting heritage. To round it off, there is a choice of three restaurants.
