The John & Pauline Tonks Book Collection

GT History Group are very pleased to accept the collection of history books and genealogical tables

of English and European royal families from the estate of John and Pauline Tonks who died within a few months of each other recently.

John and Pauline had been members of GT since coming to France in 2007, following their retirement and their marriage in England. Both had a longstanding interest in genealogy and as well as running courses in the subject for GT members, John had traced his own family back as far as King Canute. A particular interest was the family trees of English and European royal families and their interconnections as a result of which the Collection contains a large number of history books on monarchs and prominent public figures of their time.

These have now been incorporated into the History Group Library, details of which

are available on the GT website, and can be accessed by all GT members. The History Group is delighted to receive this kind donation from John and Pauline who, as well as being members of Get Together were also members of Les Jardiniers de Poitou gardening club and active in raising funds for the Combined Services Support Group.

This month our presenter is Gaynor Mickelborough speaking on *The Search for Marianne*.

The search for Marianne began with the advent of the *First Republic* in 1792.

The new Republic sought a new and distinct symbol to represent its aims and philosophies, and sought a figurehead that would

unite a divided nation behind the ideals of *liberté, égalité, fratenité* rather than the absolutist dictat of the *Ancien Régime*. In order to achieve this end, Marianne has had to be essentially all things to all men, and (to quote the French government's official website) had to appear 'at times fiery and warlike', whilst at the same time displaying the 'pacific and nurturing' republican breast. An obviously impossible task for a man, but no less difficult for a woman in a man's world: unless, of course, one accepts that Marianne's obvious and well-endowed femininity was (and still is?) nothing other than a male construct – a product of the search by innumerable French revolutionaries, presidents and politicians for the perfect allegorical image in an imperfect social and political milieu. Consequently, Marianne has been born and reborn in various guises during the course of five republics and two world wars – a topic that provides us with an illuminating study in itself. But perhaps the more pertinent question is – have they found her yet or is it a question of 'dreaming on'? EU UK Referendum – VOTING

A GT Member Writes:

We have received an application to remain on the Electoral Register of the constituency in Yorkshire where we lived before moving to France and where we have been registered annually for a postal vote to enable us to vote in UK General Elections. This is due to expire in April and we have applied for its renewal. I spoke to the lady in the office dealing with voter registrations and she confirmed that so long as we have been absent from UK for less than 15 years we would continue to remain on the electoral roll and would therefore be eligible to vote in the Referendum on continued UK membership of EU which is likely to be held later this year and could be held as early as June.

I understand that the criterion for voting in this Referendum, which has only recently been agreed, is inclusion on the current Electoral Register which is being updated at this time.

You may be already aware of this, but there may be other members who will wish to vote in the Referendum who are not aware of the need to be included on the current electoral register.

So act now!

The UK Car Hire Rip-off

Before recently going over to the UK I was mindful of comments friends have made over the perils of hiring a car in the UK – problems with insurance and age of the driver.

The question of my being older than 70 did not arise as the web sites seemed to cater for a range up to 99 years of age. It was insurance where there was a trap for the unwary.

I booked a car on the internet through an agent [HolidayAutos] which offered a genuine discount on the prices published on the Hire Companies' websites at the same time offering insurance to cover the excess charges which would be at risk as these excess charges varied between £900 and £1200. I chose to ignore this opportunity and left it until arriving at the point of collection of the car – big mistake!

The cost of Excess Protection Insurance through HolidayAutos would have been $\pounds 6.60$ per day. At the collection of the car the charge offered by Hertz was $\pounds 20$ per day which I refused because the hire charges for the Ford Focus were only $\pounds 12.50$ per day. To me, clearly a rip-off.

Surprisingly, when I returned home I checked on the internet with all the Hire Companies that were at the airport only to find that not one of these companies advertised the cost of their Excess Protection Insurance each stating that it could be purchased when collecting the car [not when booking the car through their website.]

The Hertz check-in employee rubbished the Insurance offered by HolidayAutos but when checking it at home I found that it was a good policy provided by AXA. Therefore,

*Do book through an agent to obtain a better hire price,

*Do take out Excess Cover Insurance either privately or through an agent <u>before</u> collecting the car.

*Do <u>NOT</u> rely on a Car Hire Co. to give you the best prices for hire or insurance.

PS For my next trip to the UK I attempted to follow my own advice only to find that the cheaper Insurance through Holiday Autos was not an option. Following a telephone conversation with them in which I "asked" them to prove that they were not discriminating against me for some unstated reason, they confirmed that Enterprise Car Rentals would not allow Holiday Autos to advertise this insurance when

Enterprise's cars were chosen for hire – presumably as an "encouragement" to take out the insurance when collecting the car, at a greatly inflated price.
