WalkFri 27th May10.30 amSecondigny

Note 10.30 am start (Can't get Beccy out of bed in the morning!)

We will walk round the lake and the little forest across the main road. It's fairly flat but there's an incline in the wood. If it's been raining – it will definitely be wet around the lake – so suitable needed footwear etc The walk will be approx 7 kms and a shorter walk of 3 kms.

We will meet at :

Super U car park in Secondigny. They have a toilet in Super U and public loos across the road.

Super U is on Place du Marche, Secondigny, 79130.

The Place du Marche is in the centre of Secondigny, off the D748.

Look for the Hotel de Ville or Petit Theatre – it's just behind.

We will eat at L'Ecu de France, 2 rue du Poitou, 79130, Secondigny. It is just across from Super U and will be open if anyone wants to stay there for a coffee instead of walking.

Entree, Plat (Meat or Fish), Dessert with wine & tea or coffee – 15 Euros each.

WalkSat 11th June10.30 amSt Coutant

The walk will start from the car park of the "Salle des Associations" in St Coutant and will be approximately 8km with a short cut for those who don't wish to walk the full distance.

The route is boggy at the moment but we hope that it will be dryer in June. Suitable footwear should of course be worn.

Lunch will be at Le Petit Berland in Lezay (in the main square adjacent to the Pharmacie) at a cost of

15 Euros and will consist of four courses with ¼ wine and coffee included. There will be a choice of "Comfit de canard" or fish.

Directions:

From Lezay, take the D105 towards St Vincent le Châtre. After passing Ruisseau (2km from Lezay approx), take the next left signed St Coutant. Take care here as the main road bends right, making it difficult to see on-coming traffic. Follow the road towards St Coutant, passing a Plant Nursery on the right and take the next right, signed "Salle des Associations".

Take the next left and follow the track round to the car park. Grid Ref. 46° 13' 50" N 0° 00' 45" W

There are no toilets at the start.

L'Abbaye Royale de Fontevraud (<u>www.fontevraud.fr</u>) was founded in 1101 as a religious community for women *and* men. It became a monastic city built over 34 acres. Monastic life was ended by the revolution and in 1804 when it was converted to a prison which was not closed until 1963. It is also noted for the tombs of Henry 2nd, Eleanor of Aquitaine, Richard the Lionheart and

Isobelle, wife of King John.

We have organised a one hour and thirty minute tour with an English speaking guide. Fontevraud is approx 1 hour & a quarter from Parthenay, just south east of Saumur. We will meet at the restaurant just before 12 noon.

If you wish to reserve your place (places limited), primarily please email or phone David Sewell. Your place will not be secured until your cheque has been received.

This 14 Euros deposit (which we have to pay in advance) is for the tour of the Abbaye ONLY and is unfortunately NON-REFUNDABLE.

When David has received your cheque he will send you a map of Fontevraud giving details of where we will meet and restaurant etc.

The cost of the meal will be approx 16 Euros (we are still negotiating) which will be payable on the day.

Please note there will probably be a 15 minute walk from the restaurant to the Abbaye and the guided tour commences at 2.30 pm.

All bookings and cheques must be received before Friday June 3rd.
