Subject: Agnes Sorel, the first official mistress to a French King – Presenter: Robert Pierson

It was Joan of Arc who got the Oscar. It was Joan the martyr whose gilded statue would stand in Paris. It was Joan who was beatified, "Saint Joan". Plays extol her courage. And yet, her true impact on the 100 years war, against the English was small. Perhaps she did crown and encourage the timid, fearful, dithering Dauphin who became Charles VII. And yet, there in the shadows, stands a second woman who really did inspire Charles to earn his title, "Charles the Victorious", for expelling the English, the mighty English, from France: and she was Agnes Sorel.

Pope Pius II, a contemporary, wrote of her, "A certain Agnes, called the Beautiful, of noble origin, came to the court of the king (1444). She was so very, very, beautiful that she stole a king's heart. In a little time, his passion became a kind of madness; he could not bear to live even an hour without her. Whether dining, or in the Counsel chamber, or in his bed chamber he wanted her by his side."

The story of Agnes Sorel is, in one sense, bright and lovely; we know, precisely, what she looked like and we know something of her influence at court. In another sense, she remains a tragic figure, dying young. She might have been murdered. Courtiers were ever competitive, conniving, often nasty, often vicious.

So, be reminded of a modern tragedy and of another beautiful, tragic mistress who died young and who might have been murdered. Perhaps Agnes Sorel and Marilyn Monroe compare notes, out there....somewhere over the rainbow.

From West (Champdeniers), via Saint Georges de Noisne, Chantecorps and La Pagerie, mainly D329.

From East (Poitiers), via La Torchaise and Sanxay, mainly D3. The restaurant itself is in the centre of the Bourg, opposite the small chapel.

Walk Sat 9th July Septvret Report by Tanya Lazar

On Saturday July 9, Margaret and David Boardman led a group of 20 two-legged and 3 four-legged walkers on an unusually sight-studded and varied trek starting and ending in Sepvret. The long walk was 8km, the shorter version 4km.

We enjoyed ideal weather for our purpose: slightly overcast with a refreshing breeze. Just a few metres into the walk, our first point of interest was an impressive stone double archway, the remaining vestige of 14th century château de Sepvret.



Following paved road and dirt track, through open areas and woods, we passed an 8th century stone well of Circé, surviving the long-gone château de Plessis Sénéchal. The 4km group turned off shortly after, while the 8km group continued on in a loop, stopping to admire an old Logis now converted to multiple dwellings with expansive views of rolling hills, still green in July! A huge, beautifully renovated Pigeonnier is part of the property. Following our path around a big loop, we were able also to see it from across the small valley. Through the woods, down a somewhat rough and wet track, our

route then opened out to a charming house with a picturesque lavatier, which is the source the Sevres Nortais.

More ups and downs took us through The Wood of Wise Sayings, 8 tablets scattered along the trail, with philosophical quotes in praise of nature. We rejoined the rest of our group in front of the Sepvret Mairie.

We were a hungry, lively bunch of 23 for a very enjoyable lunch at Trois Pigeons in Chenay.
