The afternoon began with an introduction to the author and the play, delivered by Richard with his usual mix of informative comment laced with humour. There was also a viewing of two short excerpts from different televised versions of the play, which allowed us an insight into the characters from an actor's perspective – a first for the Reading Circle, I believe. The stage set, there followed a wide-ranging discussion on the role of time within the play, with particular reference to the 'Inspector' and his sudden appearance and – indeed – disappearance. In general, we were all agreed that the play contains a wealth of political, social and economic comment written in a year (1945) when the old and new social orders were about to collide. In summary, a short play, but a truly gargantuan work: an excellent choice Richard!

Exhausted by our endeavours, we were then treated to a fresh strawberry tart and

some Millionaire's Shortbread, impressive enough to have been professionally prepared, although the amount of flour on Richard's nose and forehead proved otherwise. Robert Pierson once again entertained his audience with a lively illustrated presentation on Napoleon III and the Second Empire. Rather in the shadow of his more notorious uncle, Napoleon !, this Napoleon nevertheless oversaw many changes, social, cultural and economic, during his reign as last monarch of France and aimed to reassert French influence in Europe. Mechanisation was taking hold. He oversaw the rapid expansion of the French railway system; he

engaged Hausseman to plan his grand boulevards; he sent his wife and son to attend the opening of the Suez canal. Robert touched on many of these aspects so as to give us a broad brushstroke of the man and his times, including the influences of his mother, Hortense de Beauharnais and wife, the Empress Eugenie. For those who would like to read more about Napoleon III, Robert has suggested "The Shadow Emperor" by Alan Strauss-Schom...(Ambersley Publishing).

We once again returned to our usual venue at L'Auberge des Voyageurs in Menigoute for this meeting. Denis and Elisabeth, the new proprietors, made us most welcome and in spite of a long wait, lunch when it was eventually served was tasty and copious.
