The March walk will be a 90 minute stroll, approx 6 kms along the banks of the River Sevre. The meeting point will be the visitors' car park at Chateau Coudray-Salbart, Chemin de Salbart,79410 Echire. The only shorter walk option is to turn around part way and retrace your steps. There are no toilets anywhere on this walk, but there are in the centre of Echire village opposite the church and next to the butter factory.

Having said all this I should point out that when the intrepid leaders of this expedition (the Ritchie's) tried it at the beginning of February we got about a third of the way round before the path disappeared under a torrent of water as the river burst its banks. However since they are currently marooned in the waterpark that is the UK it will be mid March before this route can be confirmed. Any change of plan will be communicated to you well before the 27th.

Wherever the walk happens the midday nosh-up will be at **Cafe des Sports**, **Rue Herpens**, **St Gelais**, a five minute car journey from our preferred route and any alternative we might have to find. **Non walkers most welcome as always**. February's History Group talk was "Archaeology, what it is, why we do it and how it is done" given by our 'resident archaeologist' Nick Wells. We heard how as a youngster he had been inspired by Asterix and Raiders of the Lost Ark (but that the later Time Team was more realistic) and Michael Wood's "in Search of" Series. He told

us about some of the international digs he had worked on and how he was now working on a site in Buckinghamshire which is in the path of the new HS2 railway line. We learned that there are different styles of approach and that both hi-tech and low-tech devices are used.

He reminded us that we had an interesting site nearby at Sanxay to visit and that there maybe an adjacent town to the already excavated site and that crops have been sown to help 'read' the remains.

Nick's talk finished far too soon but for those who wanted to continue with the theme he recommended two books to read. 'The Practical Archaeologist' by Jane McIntosh and 'Archaeological Theory; an Introduction' by Matthew Johnson. The afternoon finished with tea, coffee and cakes supplied by the Voyagers.
