# Second Reading Circle 21<sup>st</sup> April Via Zoom Report by Michele Hansford



In our Zoom meeting we discussed Geraldine Brook's 2008 novel about a fictional book conservator who comes to Sarajevo in the aftermath of the civil war to restore a mediaeval illustrated Haggadah. The story is loosely based on real events and follows the possible story of the book from its rediscovery in the ruins of war-torn Sarajevo to its creation in the last days of the Moorish rule in fifteenth century Spain.

On the whole the group enjoyed the book. The novel is based on the true story of an ancient Jewish religious book saved from destruction in both World War II and the break up of Yugoslavia - each time by a Muslim librarian. We all found the descriptions of war torn Sarajevo very moving. This was not surprising as the author was a war correspondent in Bosnia in the 90s. We found the modern day sections of the book well written but as the story moves back into the past there was some dissatisfaction with the storyline and with the style of writing which seemed at times to be too journalistic.

I would say that we would recommend the book but as  $3/4^*$  rather than a whole hearted  $5^*$ .
