It was a small and select few who met for the review of *Cloud Cuckoo Land* by Anthony Deor. Thank you Joyce for hosting

We all only finished the book either the day before or that morning!

We all felt that it felt disjointed at the beginning and that it took ages for us to understand what the story was about and where it was going and the characters involved. However, once you had figured it out, it was a good story which connected together in the end very well. Bothy Yvonne and myself read reviews about it which convenience us to preserver!

The story centres about an ancient Greek book, lost to time called Cloud Cuckoo Land. It contained a fantastical, silly tale of a shepherd who longs for a far away place, only to want to return home once he is there.

The book covers from Alexandra the Greats siege of Constantinople to hundreds of years in to the future. There are many main characters throughout the time period, but all of them are affected in some way the tale of the shepherd and it gives them hope. We all loved the stories in the end, but the ending was a bit abrupt!
