We were treated to a Chateau la Tour Carnet 2021, a Bordeaux, followed by a Burgundy Beaune de Château AOP 2020 Premier Cru 100% Pinot Noir and lastly we sampled a Rioja, DOC Finca La Emperatriz 2018, mainly made from the



Tempranillo grape \Box .

The Rioja may have just edged it in the popularity stakes!

A most enjoyable evening and it's great to be able to try more expensive wines that we probably wouldn't consider buying, it gave us all food for thought
